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A Letter from the CEO

When I look back on the past year, I am filled with gratitude for the generosity of our donors and the steadfast commitment of our employees, board members, and community partners. You make it possible for us to provide meaningful opportunities for learning and growth. Your advocacy and support help preserve incredible services that can't be found elsewhere in Western New York.

We began our 2025 fiscal year with two extraordinary and unexpected moments. In September 2024, we received a pivotal phone call from the New York State Department of Education: they had finally approved a reimbursement rate for our Summit Academy Enhanced program. This program—the only one of its kind in New York State—fulfills a vital need for students with challenging behaviors, and we were thrilled to know it would continue.



That very same day, President Amy Jablonski and I were driving to Rochester to attend an event hosted by the Golisano Foundation. We received another unforgettable surprise that afternoon. Tom Golisano, philanthropist and founder of Paychex, announced \$360 million in donations to 82 nonprofit organizations, and he revealed that The Summit Center would receive a historic gift of \$5 million. It was a surreal moment. To experience two monumental announcements in one day was beyond anything I could have imagined.

Mr. Golisano's unprecedented investment comes at a time when the need for services is greater than ever, and this gift will be used to expand the depth and breadth of the services we provide. Families are seeking support in record numbers, and waiting lists for specialized programs continue to grow. In April 2025, the Centers for Disease Control published autism rates from surveillance year 2022. The data showed that approximately 1 in 31 children were diagnosed. Increased awareness and better diagnostic tools have led to more children being identified at a young age, including individuals who may have previously gone undiagnosed.

Every day, our team helps children and adults develop foundational skills, gain independence, and build brighter futures. Whether it's the Early Autism Program, Summit Academy, Community Habilitation, or respite care, our programs are tailored to the unique needs of the individuals we support. Just as importantly, they provide families with the understanding and encouragement they deserve.

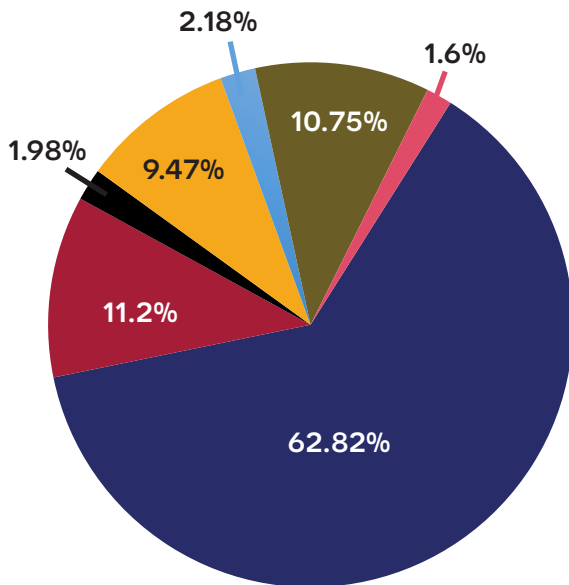

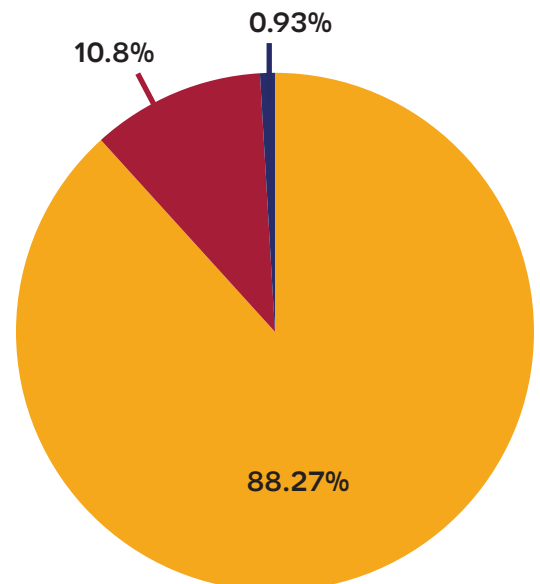

Donor Highlight

Tom Golisano makes historic gift to support individuals with disabilities

Civic leader and philanthropist Tom Golisano, the founder of Paychex, awarded The Summit Center a historic gift of \$5 million as part of a multi-million dollar giveaway in September 2024. The donation was made with the intention of augmenting programs for children and adults with developmental disabilities.

During a press conference, Mr. Golisano revealed donations of \$360 million to a total of 82 nonprofit organizations across upstate New York. Funds were awarded to organizations in the health care, human services, education, and animal welfare sectors. The purpose of the press conference was kept a secret—CEO Lisa Foti and President Amy Jablonski were absolutely shocked when The Summit Center’s gift was announced.

Lisa shared, “Words cannot express how grateful we are to Mr. Golisano for his incredible generosity. This gift is unprecedented, one that will be used to increase the depth and breadth of services at Summit and strengthen our financial independence.”

Philanthropy is what fuels our vision, and plans are underway to maximize the impact of Mr. Golisano’s gift on the landscape of autism services in Western New York. We are focused on expanding our educational programming to provide more children with the support they need.

Education & Early Intervention Division

Early Autism Program helps child reach new milestones

Three-year-old Nathan loves singing, animals, and being surrounded by his friends. Through the Early Autism Program, Nathan grew tremendously, developing new skills and learning how to meaningfully engage with his peers.

Nathan began early intervention services when he was 18 months old. At the time, he had no verbal language and did not imitate simple tasks, such as waving or clapping.

Now, Nathan is speaking in complete sentences and will ask and answer questions. He participates in imaginative play and appropriately interacts with his peers.

"Nathan is now in one of Summit's full-day, integrated preschool classrooms," said Sarah Schiske, early autism program technician. "The progress he has made is absolutely incredible, and his family calls it a miracle."

His mom, Christine, said she has seen many positive changes in her son, which have impacted the family.

"We have basic communication and can get him what he wants, which has been huge for our family," Christine shared. "He's so smart and intuitive."

Nathan has also become more adventurous and enjoys playing with other children. He hops on the school bus each morning because he's excited to go to school.

"We are thankful for Ms. Sarah and for the support Summit gave us," Christine said. "Summit provides that extra care."

Education & Early Intervention Division

Student finds success, acceptance at Summit Academy

Each day, Jack looks forward to learning something new at school. He loves his physical education class and spending time outside.

At the age of 3, Jack was diagnosed with autism. He had minimal verbal language and difficulty regulating his behavior. His surroundings became overwhelming.

When he began attending Summit Academy, his team created an instructional plan tailored to his learning style. It focused on communication, social-emotional skills, and academic skills. Jack began to progress and thrive in the classroom.

"He's about to turn 8. The progress we've seen is amazing," said Ellen, Jack's mom. "He's starting to use his AAC device a lot more. He's become more tolerant of people being around him. He's tolerating change better than he would in the past."

Recently, Jack and his family went on vacation. Jack was able to handle the stress of a new environment, change in routine, and lots of people, something that would not have been possible two years ago.

"The structure at Summit has really made a big difference," Ellen shared. "These angels on earth who work with these children every day, love them, have fun with them, are wonderful. It is so important for a parent on this journey to see someone else believe in your kid as much as you do. There's no replacement for that."

Adult Division

Bus monitor goes above and beyond to help others

Each morning and afternoon, Pierce greets students on his bus with a smile and a positive attitude. He works as a bus monitor for a local company that provides transportation to students with disabilities.

Pierce participates in Summit's Supported Employment Program, which pairs individuals with a job coach to develop and practice job skills, explore career paths, and assist in obtaining employment.

Recently, Pierce stepped up to help temporary bus drivers while his regular driver was out on medical leave. Pierce aided the new drivers in navigating the bus routes during pick up and drop off to ensure they stayed on schedule. While the constant change in drivers caused some stressful situations for Pierce, he used the breathing technique his job coach taught him to remain calm.

Not only has he helped new drivers to be successful, but Pierce also took it upon himself to assist students who have difficulties with verbal communication. One student speaks Hindi as his first language. Pierce went above and beyond by using Google Translate to learn words in Hindi so he could effectively communicate with the student.

Pierce receives glowing performance reviews from his manager, and his job coach said he is an exemplary employee.

Community Division

Community Division enables individuals and families to thrive

Summit's Community Division supports individuals in community settings, offering programs that enhance the well-being of both participants and their families.

On-site and in-home respite services give families down time to run errands, enjoy a date night, or practice self-care. At Summit's Respite Center, participants engage in activities such as games, crafts, and movies, while in-home respite places a trained caregiver in the family's home for short-term relief.

Our BFFs (Building Friendship Fridays) program provides social opportunities for individuals with autism and other developmental disabilities, offering activities on both Tuesdays and Fridays to help build meaningful relationships. Through the community habilitation program, participants work on independence and daily living skills with a direct care provider, focusing on goals like safety awareness, shopping, and positive social interactions.

STAR (Support, Training, and Respite) provides skill building, parent and caregiver training, and intensive therapeutic support. Skill-building helps individuals develop coping, communication, and social skills needed for traditional respite programs. Training sessions led by Summit professionals cover topics such as self-advocacy, communication, and transitioning to adulthood. STAR's intensive services support individuals with higher needs through personalized plans and up to a 3:1 staff ratio, with the goal of increasing independence over time.

Behavioral Pediatrics Clinic offers welcoming environment

Delivering happiness and smiles are two goals Alicia Yu hopes to achieve each day at the Behavioral Pediatrics Clinic.

For the past five years, Alicia has worked as a billing specialist at Summit and is the first face families see when they come to the clinic.

"I want to make these families feel welcomed," she said. "I've developed a relationship with many of the families where they feel comfortable having conversations with me, and I'm here to listen."

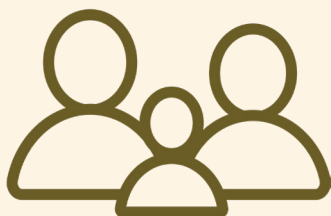
Alicia's enthusiasm and warmth helped form a unique bond with Juliana, a client of Dr. David Meichenbaum. Juliana has high-functioning autism and anxiety. Whenever she comes into the clinic, she always enjoys talking to Alicia.

"We got in a conversation a couple of years ago, and ever since we got to talking every time she comes in," Alicia shared. "She's so easy to talk to and so passionate and positive."

When Juliana found out Alicia was expecting a baby boy, she surprised her a few weeks later with a dragon stuffed animal she had made herself.

"I had tears when she gave it to me. I was so overwhelmed with happiness," Alicia said. "My son is five months old now, and he loves playing with his dragon."

It is due to the connections she has built with clients and staff that makes Alicia look forward to coming to work each day.

WNY Regional Center for Autism Spectrum Disorders

Regional Center for Autism provides educational opportunities

The Western New York Regional Center for Autism Spectrum Disorders (WNYRCASD) is a collaborative program of The Summit Center, University at Albany, and The Center for Autism and Related Disabilities.

The WNYRCASD addresses the needs of children and young adults with autism spectrum disorder and offers educational opportunities to support parents, teachers, school administrators, human service providers, and other related professionals.

More than 1,100 parents and professionals across 48 counties in New York State attended trainings on strategies to address challenging behaviors, supporting emotional regulation, building communication skills, and more. A total of 14 workshops were held for professionals, and five were held for parents and caregivers. More than 90% of participants rated the trainings as excellent or good.

The 2025 annual conference "Meeting the Unique Needs of Autistic Individuals with Diverse Strengths" was held in March with more than 400 professionals attending. Conference presenters focused on topics of the impact of executive dysfunction in the classroom, transitioning to adulthood, and supporting students in making social connections.

Additionally, the WNYRCASD offered the Bowling Social Skills Group, which provided engaging activities that supported social, emotional, and behavioral skill development. Each session began with a structured social skills lesson followed by a game of bowling to practice the skills learned. A total of 40 children participated in this group.

657 school professionals attended workshops provided by the WNYRCASD.

\$304,000 raised through 2025 Autism Walk

Every year, parents, family members, employees, and corporate and community partners come together to celebrate acceptance and inclusion at The Summit Center Autism Walk. As the largest fundraising event for autism services in Western New York, 100% of donations are used to support individuals and families in the greater Buffalo region.

The 2025 Autism Walk, held on May 10, raised \$304,000 through the dedication of nearly 2,500 participants, donors, and volunteers. The theme "Build Foundations" reminded supporters of the importance of helping children and adults with autism build foundational skills that lead to greater independence and well-being. For the fifth consecutive year, West Herr served as the presenting sponsor. Tops provided extensive product and promotional support as our premium food and beverage sponsor.

For the 10th year in a row, Claudia Rosenecker was the top fundraiser. Rounding out the top five were Candace DeMarti, Laura Chouinard, Meghan Gadawski, and Steve Anderson. Funds from the Autism Walk are used to sustain increased staffing levels across our programs and services, provide professional development opportunities, and invest in capital improvements that improve the safety and function of our facilities.
